Dear Parent(s), carer(s) and students,

Our first week back after half term has been a very positive and busy one for all concerned and it's not over yet as we host the Lourdes Pilgrimage Fundraiser Quiz tonight in the hall.

At the start of the week our thoughts and prayers were with, and for, the Holy Father, Pope Francis. In this Jubilee Year as Pilgrims of Hope our prayers were very much in hope for improved health and recovery of his Holiness as he battled pneumonia. We know

This Sunday is the last Sunday in **Ordinary time** for a while as the liturgical season of **Lent** starts next week on Ash Wednesday. This Sunday's Gospel is from St Luke and Jesus says, "Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye?"

Hypocrisy - telling people what to do and not following the right path oneself - always resulted in a stern warning from Jesus. Often it was the Pharisees who provoked Jesus' wrath for hypocritical behaviour and condemnation of their neighbour. This time it is the disciples to whom he issues a strong warning and, in speaking to them, he speaks also to us. He condemns those who accuse others of sins that they themselves are guilty of committing.

For Jesus the heart was the centre of compassion, as it must be for us. As Pope Francis writes in his latest encyclical Dilexit Nos: "Living as we do in an age of superficiality, rushing frenetically from one thing to another ... all of us need to rediscover the importance of the heart."

We must have a heart large enough to encompass all the injustices we see around us and be prepared to do something about them. Our compassion and help must be generous and freely given. As we approach the season of Lent, may we learn to be liberal with our charity, both in judgement and practically at home and abroad, to show we truly follow the call of Jesus without counting the cost.

Give me a heart, O God, large enough to see as you see the suffering of others and to work to spread your love and compassion for all. Amen.

Next week with our annual Key Stage 3 Pancake Races on Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday Services in school next Wednesday morning we will commence **Lent**. This will, as ever, be an important time for us all with our focus on prayer, almsgiving and fasting during this Holy season where once again we will come

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together united in our commitment to Catholic Social Teaching to act in solidarity for the common good and with those less fortunate than us and commit to acts of charity.

### **Literacy: World Book Day**

# National Offer Day - Monday 3rd March 2025

Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2025 is National Offer Day for secondary schools when all parents and carers who have applied for a Year 7 place for their child will receive notification of the outcome of their application either electronically or by post. If a family has named Hagley Catholic High School on their application and is offered a place at the school, they must confirm acceptance of this offer through whatever process their Local Authority indicates.

### **Careers and STEM**

Year 7 & 8 today took part in a roadshow from BAE systems in collaboration with The Royal Navy and Air Force with the aim of opening students' eyes to the broad and varied careers achieved from studying STEM subjects. Students were able to see a Robotic Dog in action and learnt about some of the latest Artificial Intelligence systems.



### **Medical Society**

Our Medical Society were privileged to visit the Three Counties Medical School in Worcester on Wednesday. They heard first hand from current medical students about the different pathways into Medicine, before participating in a carousel of activities including using state of the art holographic dissection tables, learning how to perform and interpret an ECG, debating ethical issues related to organ transplantation, and learning how to perform CPR and to stop a person from choking. Our students held their own brilliantly, demonstrating their excellent science knowledge, and confidently interacting with every task throughout the day. # **Poland Trip**



Over the first weekend of half term students from Years 10 and 11 had the most fantastic opportunity to visit Poland. While they were there, they had the opportunity to visit Auschwitz Birkenau, the Galicja Jewish Museum, meet with Righteous Among the Nations, take a 3-hr guided tour of the Jewish Quarter, Schindler's Factory Museum and a

guided tour of Wawel Castle, plus an evening meal at Jewish Restaurant "Ariel" including dinner and Klezmer music concert. Students also had free time in Krakow to explore the local markets and shops. It was the most fabulous trip and the feedback from students and parents/carers has been excellent. A huge public thanks to Mrs Price who led the trip.



This was such a wonderful opportunity for our daughter with such varied activities throughout the trip. They were busy the whole time and I am so glad that she had this opportunity. The trip was excellent!

My son really enjoyed the trip. Lots of activities to do. He felt he had time to speak to other staff members, peers he didn't usually at school. I would just like to thank the staff for arranging and giving up their time for this experience.

My son was lucky enough to get a place on the Poland trip via the waiting list this year. From start to finish, the communication and organisation was excellent. The trip itself was well organised, thought out and gave students the opportunity to be immersed in the local culture, reflect on the events of the Holocaust, expand their knowledge of Judaism and also spend time with their friends. There was an excellent mixture of learning, exploring and, from what I am told, immense amounts of fun! ...... experiences that will stay with him for a lifetime. Opportunities that do not exist within other schools. I felt that he was safe and supported at all times. This is the longest he has been away from home and certainly the furthest he has travelled without me but I felt secure in the knowledge that he was with people who would keep him safe.

I consider it a privilege that we are part of the Hagley family and that my child is taught and surrounded by dedicated, hardworking adults that make up the staff team. My son was a child who hated being away from home and now is a young man who thrives, gets on a plane and goes and this is partly due to the secure environment he goes to every day.



More student success has been revealed to me this week with Catherine in Year 8, a member of Stourport Rowing Club, competing in her first competition at Trafford Rowing Club, Manchester last Saturday and winning her event in the double skull. This weekend she should have been heading off to a West Midlands Regional competition to compete in the double and quad but sadly the event has been cancelled because of the high river levels but we wish her well for her next event in a few more weeks.

Elsewhere on the back of their success in the Country Cross Country Championships back in January I can confirm that both Will Kennedy and Ruben Ray have qualified for the Cross Country National Championships on 15<sup>th</sup> March 2025 in West Sussex. Once more we hope they go well and shall wait with baited breadth for news.
