



Dear Parent(s), carer(s) and students,

This will be my last letter of this term and this calendar year; I do hope that 2024 has been a positive year for you and has brought you much joy and that you are filled with hope for the new year ahead.

This Sunday is the third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday, a Latin word that means rejoice and this weekend we light the pink candle on our Advent Wreaths. In 2014 Pope Francis said that on Gaudete Sunday instead of fretting about all we "still haven't done" to prepare for Christmas we should "think of all the good things life has given you."



I hope you and all our students can find time this weekend to reflect on, and rejoice in, the gifts we have received this year and perhaps the gifts we have shared too.

This Advent we can rejoice in the generosity of our community. Over 2100 items were donated as part of our Reverse Advent Calendar appeal for the homeless this year, thank you so very much.

All the items were bagged up by our Sixth Form B-Attituders group and delivered across Birmingham City Centre yesterday afternoon. The joy this brought to those on the streets of the city was overwhelming for our staff and students and was once again gratefully received.

Provision for the homeless in the city is at an all time low with fewer and fewer hostels that can offer respite from the cold and damp conditions for those without a roof over their head. Your generosity has gone some very small way to alleviating this.

• Reviewing school notices


Working with outside Agencies:

Developing our Literacy Culture at Hagley



The latest Book Swap event enabled students across the school to bring, swap, share and take away a free book.

We are supporting sustainability in 'reusing' unwanted books and promoting reading by encouraging visible reading, conversations about books, our reading likes and dislikes and making sure books are a visible and enjoyable part of Hagley life. There were certainly some 'gems' which got donated and found new homes!



We have other opportunities to purchase new books through our online Book Club selling new books at various points during the year and, at the beginning of March, to help us celebrate World Book Day, we have our Book Fair at Hagley, 6th March 2025 is a date for your diary! However, books can be costly and, as well as actively advocating that Hagley families join their local library and borrow books for free, the termly Book Swap events help to make reading accessible for all.

I still have boxes of books ready to go to new homes, so if you/your child would like to come and browse the books available please send them to me in DG2 and I will help them find something to read they will enjoy!

Thank you to the students who helped run the Book Swap and to all those students, staff and families who donated and/or took a book away to read.

As part of our strategy and focus on literacy everyone who attends Hagley should expect to be able to read at, or above, their chronological age and our form time reading, or DEAR (Drop Everything and Read) is a whole school reading strategy we are using to support students to develop their reading ability and promote reading for pleasure.

Texts have been chosen specifically to introduce key themes which are appropriate to the age of the students in each year group and contain themes which echo the PSHE themes studied in the year.

In addition, the texts offer us a fantastic opportunity to broaden our students' exposure to a diverse range of contexts and representation by carefully selecting our writers and texts to ensure that we have representation from female authors, BAME authors and address themes which enhance our PSHE programme, generating discussion around the texts and the experiences and ideas contained.

Every Tuesday morning the bell rings at 10am and the whole school stops to read and share a text together as a form group. Students follow their own copy of the text but listen to their teacher (a proficient reader) reading aloud to them and modelling expert fluency and expression. The teacher uses additional strategies to develop students' comprehension skills and word knowledge by stopping to talk about the text, explaining key vocabulary and comprehension and through encouraging discussion around the key themes, plot and characters.



Overview of the form readers:

- Year 7 'War Horse' belonging, friendships, identity, war
- Year 8 'The Boxer' fear, hope, identity, risks and consequences, prejudice, kindness
- Year 9 'The Outsiders' conflict, rivalry, violence, poverty, class, moral choices, influence of the group
- Year 10 'Boys Don't Cry' -masculinity, marginalised backgrounds, healthy lifestyles, stereotypes, family, relationships
- Year 11 'My Name is Leon' belonging, loss and grief, different constructs of family, nature/ nurture, adoption, community/ society
- Year 12/13 Academic reading and private reading choice

Modelling fluency for our students is important in supporting reading ability as evidence suggests that an ability to read with fluency is the bridge between decoding words and comprehension. Supporting students' fluency and expression aids their ability to comprehend and understand texts (at speed) and at secondary level, the texts they are exposed to become increasingly challenging with GCSE texts having a reading age of around 16 years.

There is a significant correlation between student reading ability and performance at GCSE level and, of course, reading ability is a skill which will enhance a person's life well-beyond school exams.

I hope you all find time for a good book this Christmas and into 2025! *Mrs E Lawson (Whole School Literacy Lead)*
